The Story of Roxy

On July 11th, the For Pets' Sake Dog Program Coordinator was contacted by an employee at the Cortez Shelter. One of her neighbors witnessed a dog being pushed out of a red SUV several days earlier, and the dog had been running around the neighborhood ever since. This neighbor thought the dog had been eating her feral cat food and also thought the dog was aggressive because she had barked at her.

We took a trap to the neighbor's property and got it set up with some rotisserie chicken. The next morning, the dog was in the trap and once we had her loaded up, she proved to be sweet and friendly and not aggressive at all. We named her Roxy and she appears to be about a year to a year and a half old, obviously already had at least one litter, maybe a Catahoula Great Dane mix. She's a beautiful girl with unusual markings and a powerful dog just learning leash manners. She was a little thin so we got her some high-quality food right away. Once she spent a week or two eating good food, her ideal weight turns out to be about 68 pounds. We discovered she already knows some commands including sit, down, shake, stay. And she's also doing pretty well with the head harness.

She's been living in foster home Debbie and John Davis' guest house by herself for about 6 weeks, and she's behaved flawlessly. No messes, no destruction. We got her fully vetted and spayed. She's goofy and fun and exuberant —a really great dog and we're still perplexed why somebody would dump her like that and we're determined to find her the best possible forever home where she'll never be abandoned again. We shared her on Facebook and sent her out to rescue partners for weeks, and she received no interest. Finally, we asked the founder of Denkai Animal Sanctuary to share her to her contacts, and within 15 minutes, she sent us a response from a woman living just 20 minutes away with three acres, another mellow male dog, and horses. We took her out for the meet and greet and she did so well. Roxy was a little reactive to the horses at first, but the woman has training experience and is sure that she can work with that. It looks like Roxy found her love connection! Now she'll have lots of adventures on the riding trails around Mancos. Happy life, Roxy!!!

Ava and Her Babies

On August 10th, a FPS volunteer received a call from a friend's sister. An acquaintance of hers had given away her young female dog named Ava, and then was later alarmed to see pictures of Ava incredibly emaciated. She had also been allowed to breed, and had eight one-month old puppies nursing on her incredibly thin body. Thankfully these two young women were able to get Ava and her puppies back from these people that were starving her. FPS reached out to rescue partners with photos and the story, looking for a rescue partner to take the whole family. A huge ask.

Oh Be Dogful Rescue's Founder and Executive Director, Leigh, immediately responded and said she would take all of them! Then the mad rush was on to get them to their rescue in Crested Butte. Volunteers Debbie Davis and Louis King split the task, and the whole little family arrived safely just a few days later.



Leigh fell in love with them right away, and got busy getting good food in them all, and making sure they were healthy. Mama Ava and Leigh formed a special bond and are spending lots of time together so Ava's getting all the socialization and good experiences that she missed out on in her past life. All the little puppies are thriving and adopters are being pre-screened. We are so grateful for our amazing rescue partners and foster homes. Without them, these animals would have no hope.

Meet the Fosters

Mr. Tristan is a gorgeous, happy-go-lucky, 4-month-old tabby point Siamese boy. We were contacted by his caretaker because he had a very bad upper respiratory infection and there was a concern that he had been injured—it seemed that his back legs just didn't work quite right. Tristan was relinquished to For Pets' Sake and he was quickly taken to Mill Creek Animal Hospital in Moab to be checked out. He was put on antibiotics for his infection, but they were unable to determine at the time what might be wrong with his back legs because it was intermittent. He improved very quickly from his upper respiratory infection, but he would still stumble around at times, his back end would sway when he walked and he would sometimes lean on walls for stability. Through past experience, we were able to determine that he had a mild case of the neurological disorder called cerebellar hypoplasia, also known as CH or wobbly kitten syndrome.

Cerebellar Hypoplasia is a developmental condition where the cerebellum of the brain fails to develop properly. This is the part of the brain that controls balance, stability, and fine motor skills. This condition is not painful or contagious and there is no change in life expectancy. The most common cause is when a pregnant cat is exposed to the panleukopenia virus and passes the infection to her unborn kittens. Though there is no cure or treatment, the symptoms will not worsen and kittens easily learn to live with the disability.

Tristan has adapted very well to his condition and knows his limitations. He certainly makes up in personality what he lacks in coordination. He is just a happy, loving, and playful boy who has a cute little swagger to his step. Tristan will be heading to one of our rescue partners very soon where he will find his forever home.



Update on Dolly:

Post-op 4 weeks and 3 days

We took Dolly, the dog with the broken leg and pelvis, back to Mill Creek Animal Hospital in Moab to have Dr. Scott evaluate an area on her right back leg which had the surgery for the compound fracture of her tibia. There was a two-inch by two-inch swelling at the surgery site. He was pleased at how well she is using the leg and that she has gained nine pounds.

After examining the site, he wanted to get an x-ray. Hardware is still in place and holding. Many of the small pieces of bone are indeed healing and filling in the gaps. The swelling on the leg is the result of an infection at one end of the main break in the bone. This is not healing so well.

Dr. Scott advised that if we could clear up the infection, hopefully that too will heal. He added another antibiotic and said to re-check in four weeks. If the leg gets worse (i.e., the infection spreads, or she stops walking on the leg), we need to bring her back sooner. So, we will wait and see how things progress.
